Catholic Worker House (contact:

Marlene Nowak) A safe haven home for families perhaps fleeing dangers or struggling to begin life anew. The house provides food and living necessities while working family members find employment, independence and a place of their own.

Dismas House (contact: Elaine Nicorski)

A house for people making the transition from prison. Former prisoners live with Notre Dame/St. Mary's students in a home environment. Volunteers prepare a meal for house residents each second Wednesday of the month.

Hope Ministries (contact: Steve Fodroczi)

Provides food, clothing and shelter for the homeless. Volunteers cook and serve dinner on the first Tuesday of the month.

La Casa de Amistad (contact: Marlene

Nowak) This group assists refugees to become legal residents of our community. This center empowers members of the Michiana Latino community providing educational, cultural and advocacy services in a welcoming bi-lingual environment.

Northeast Neighborhood Food Pantry (Contacts: Jim Kapsa & Nan Tulchinsky)

Located on Notre Dame Ave in the old single truck fire station, this pantry provides fresh healthy food to neighbors. Volunteers are needed to pack food baskets for a few hours during the week.

Habitat for Humanity (contact: Gene

Cavanaugh) Habitat Home ownership allows families to purchase a decent home with an affordable mortgage. Volunteers assist families working at build sites.

Our Lady of the Road (contact: Tom &

Marlene Nowak) A daytime drop-in center for folks living on the streets. OLR provides a wide range of support from clothes, food and toiletries. Sacred Heart Parish volunteers prepare and serve breakfast on the second Friday of each month.

Refugee Program (contact: Marlene

Nowak) A financial and emotional support network that enables refugees to our country to attain their independence. Volunteers assist in acquiring furniture and other items necessary for apartment living, provide transportation to medical appointments and, most important of all, be a friend.

Respect for Life Activities (contact: Mark

Witkowski & Elaine Nicorski) Volunteer opportunities available in local organizations and Right-To-Life events which promote education and action in regards to life issues that threaten the sanctity of life, demanding a response from Christians.

St. Margaret House (contact: Gini

Bartoni) A day care center welcoming women and their children who live in economic poverty. St. Margaret's provides meals and addresses immediate needs. They work to break down barriers of isolation while discovering the unique talents and gifts of everyone who walks through their doors.

St. Vincent de Paul Society (contact: Paul

Thornton) Volunteers work with those who live in our area and are in need of food, assistance with rent, utilities or financial planning. St. Vincent has been an active partner to help match the homeless with available housing. Volunteers together make 6-7 home visits each week bringing food for those in need and serve the area around Notre Dame and along Lincolnway West to the airport..
